York Rite & The Mark Master Degree

What is the York Rite?

York Rite is a descriptive term used for three cooperative groups that confer a total of ten degrees in the United States. The degrees making up the York Rite are considered concordant to the first three Masonic degrees, meaning they confer additional Masonic degrees that enlarge and expand on the first three lodge degrees.



What is the Mark Master Degree?

The first of the series of York Rite degrees is in the Royal Arch Chapter is that of Mark Master. The Stonemasons who built the great cathedrals and other buildings of the Middle Ages left behind a tiny record of individual workmanship.

It is built upon the ancient custom of Masons selecting their mark to cut into the stones they dressed in the guarry to identify the craftsman for quality control and payment. Original marks were composed of a few straight chisel cuts and occasionally a curve. The side of the stone with the mark usually faced inside the wall, so that most marks are now hidden.

During the ceremonies, the candidate enters his mark in the Mark Book and it is then his personal "brand" The Mark Master's degree also has a legend about producing the keystone that went in the principal arch of King Solomon's Temple. A Keystone with the letters "H T W S S T K S".

All Colorado Master Masons are invited!

The Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons at the 2023 annual conclave opened the Mark Master degree to any Master Mason in the State of Colorado. Any Master Mason may receive the Mark Master degree free of charge. If the induvial would like to continue into the other nine degrees of the York Rite he is eligible to petition a chapter. Any individual who completes all ten York Rite Degrees is eligible for reimbursement of all fees paid.

Greetings Brothers and Friends,





Masonic Education

Courage

by RW Bro David Sandy – PM Mt. Moriah #116 MD and PGCh – MD The Cardinal virtues of masonry are temperance, fortitude, prudence, and justice. This essay takes a closer look at Fortitude.

Fortitude associated with the pectoral or breast and within the breast beats the heart. Fortitude is another word for courage, which has its origin from the Latin word core or heart. The anatomical analogy of heart has also been connected to man's emotional nature, fortitude or courage is indeed a heart based virtue.

An examination of courage is incomplete without also examining. Masonry teaches us that the virtue of fortitude is equally distant from rashness and cowardice. This tells us that courage is not fearlessness. Neither is being afraid. The sole mark of a coward. The fearless man is reckless and foolish, while the man who allows fear to conquer him is a coward. Is the man who faces down his fears, who is courageous and has fortitude.

Fortitude enables us to undergo any pain, peril or danger, and these can take many forms. While there is physical danger, there is also mental anguish. The pain of discipline and the pain and agony of regret. Motivational speaker Jim Rohn tells us that the pain of discipline weighs oz. Yet the pain of regret weighs tons.

Similarly, courage is a virtue that has many definitions. Here are a few examples to consider of what courage looks like.

The first is physical courage, often called bravery or valor. This is personified by the soldier guarding the perimeter, or the firefighter who enters the burning building. Hollywood movies and best selling books shower us with examples of physical courage, or the lack thereof. Consider the cowardly lion in the Wizard of Oz, James Bond, Harry Potter, and John. Wayne in the Holy Scriptures we read about David and Goliath. They are all examples of physical courage yet possessing physical courage alone is no guarantee of a virtuous man. So let's look at some less obvious forms of courage.

One of these other forms of courage is perseverance. This is the courage to be determined to stick with the purpose and to be dis-

content with merely holding ground, but to continually strive forward, even in times of failure and setback. Brother and President Theodore Roosevelt speaks of this kind of courage in his citizen in a Republic speech where he describes the man in the arena. The man, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood, who strives valiantly, who errs, who comes up short again and again, the man who spends himself in a worthy cause.

Moral courage is the ability to face ethical challenges. This is the Mason who holds on to his convictions when his values are put to the test. When a Mason puts ethics into action, he is showing moral courage. Also, when he stands up for a moral principle while others are standing aside while others may choose an aloof detachment from the issues, the Mason with moral courage takes a stand. This is not merely whistle blowing, a relatively quick action. Moral courage involves ongoing integrity, exercise with poise and serving as a role model for others to. Intellectual courage is the willingness to face new ideas and solve problems. The willingness to be curious, check facts, ask questions and make mistakes. This is the courage it takes to do something, even if it might be incorrect. In other words, risk taking and daring.

The Mason with intellectual courage takes whatever time is necessary to gain a thorough understanding of a subject. He is not satisfied with just his superficial overview. He listens intently and considers others points of view. He seeks out opposing positions on issues, the Mason with intellectual courage is not afraid to say. Can you please explain that to me again? Freemasonry provides an atmosphere for free thought, where intellectual courage can be exercised. Our earlier brothers tested their ideas and the safety of their lodges then showed intellectual courage by sharing their innovations with the world.


Social courage is the quality of being comfortable in our own skin, standing tall and being the 1st to offer a handshake and greeting. It is the quality of not being a slave to the expectation of others. It is being oneself at the risk of social disapproval, the ability to express opinions without checking to see. If they are in line with others preferences is social courage. A nation with social courage stands firm against destructive peer pressure. He is the man who stands out when it

might be more comfortable to blend in. Social courage is speaking one's mind, even though the voice is quivering. The final element of this multifaceted virtual is spiritual courage. The obvious example is the Mason, who welcomes the prospect of his demise. But there's more.

Consider his spiritual courage needed to explain death to a young child. It is the courage to have faith and the fortitude to forego the need to control everything. In a fragmented world divided by sectarianism, intolerance, hatred and greed, spiritual courage means having friends who practice a faith that is different from our own. It is asking questions about other religions and being tolerant of other men's beliefs. When we are challenged and despite the risks we must take, we must all decide on the path we take. The courageous actions of others may inspire us and offer examples for emulation. But the courage to act comes from within, and each of us must look into our soul and then apply it.
